Individual Responsibilities for Emotional Support Animal

If the college grants an individual's request to live with an ESA, the individual is solely responsible for the custody and care of the ESA and must follow the guidelines.

If the Guidelines are not followed, the following penalties will be imposed.

1st offense - Warning 2nd Offense - Probation 3rd Offense - Removal. Under certain circumstances an animal can be removed without the first two.

General Responsibilities and guidelines for ESA care:

Under certain circumstances an animal can be removed without the first two.initial each statement acknowledging agreement and understanding of the statement.

The animal cannot pose a direct threat to the health or safety of		
others. If the animal is deemed to pose a physical threat to others,		
actions may be taken to remove the animal from college property.		
Animals must be housebroken. The owner is responsible for		
properly containing and disposing of all animal waste. Indoor animal waste		
must be placed in a sturdy bag tied securely before being disposed of in		
outside trash dumpsters. Outdoor animal waste, such as dog feces, must		
be immediately retrieved by the owner, placed in a plastic bag, and		
securely tied before being disposed of in outside trash dumpster.		
Emotional Support are not Service Animals and do not carry the		
same privileges.ESAs are not permitted in any college facility other than		
the college housing room or apartment the resident is assigned, which		
includes but not limited to administrative buildings, classrooms, college		
hous9ing meeting rooms, dining areas, health centers, recreational facilities		
and laundry or other common areas except for pre-determined egress route		
for toileting.		
The owner must effectively control the animal at all times. Outside		
of student's residence hall room, the animal must be leashed. If the		
resident cannot effectively control the animal, the permission to keep that		
particular animal in Residential space will be rescinded until such time that		
the problem is rectified.		
Routine care for the animal is expected for health and safety		
reasons, and includes flea and tick prevention, de-worming, rabies, other		
routine vaccinations and annual examinations. Residential Lide has the		
right to request documentation relevant to these health an safety concerns		
at any time during the animal's stay in residence.		

The cost of care, arrangements, and responsibilities for the
well-bing of an ESA are the sole responsibility of the owner at all times.
The animal cannot be left in the care of other residents while the resident is
away.
If any animal neglect is suspected, Residence life staff will contact
the owner and the Campus Security. The owner is solely responsible for the
health and safety of the animal. The animal should not be left alone in the
unit for unreasonable long periods of time. Based on the type of animal,
the resident and Residential Life agree that a reasonable amount of time
for the animal to be left alone in the unit ishours.
The owner understands that when they are not present (e.g. in
class), the animal must be crated or otherwise contained within the unit and
remain in the assigned residential space.
The owner may be charged for any damage caused by his or her
ESA beyond reasonable wear and tear to the same extent that it charges
other residents for damages beyond reasonable wear and tear.
The owner's living accommodations may also be inspected for
fleas, ticks and other pests as necessary as part of the College's standard
or routine inspections. If fleas, ticks, or other pests are detected through
inspection, the residence will be treated using approved fumigation
methods by a college approved pest control service. The owner will be
billed for the expense of any pest treatment above and beyond standard
pest management in the residents hall. The college shall have the right to
bill the individual's account for unmet obligations under this provision.
Guidelines for interaction with Roommates and the Community
The resident is responsible for any damage or injuries caused by
their animal and must take appropriate precautions to prevent property
damage or injury.
The resident is responsible for assuring that the animal does not
interfere with the orderly operation of the residence or cause difficulties for
other residents of the community, Sensitivity to residents with allergies and
to those who fear animals is important to ensure a positive residential
community.

The resident is responsible for instructing others on appropriate
interactions with the animal and setting clear expectations.
Roommates will be notified about the presence of the animal. The
notification will include the the breed and size of the animal.
Roommate/Suitemate(s) may request a room change from Residential Life
if they have a desire to do so.
When service requests are made, the resident must indicate that
there is an animal in residence and provide a cell phone number for contact if peeded. The resident is responsible to assure that the animal is under
if needed. The resident is responsible to assure that the animal is under
control-not loos-to protect the safety of staff. Where possible, a service visit will be scheduled so that the resident is present. In the event that
emergency access must be made by service staff, the college is not
responsible for an animal which escapes, nor for any harm to the animal
should the staff member believe they must protect themselves. Examples
of emergencies include but are not limited to, fire, flood, the need to access
valves or panels that serves others, system repairs needed in adjacent
space that can be accessed from the unit.

Additional Agreements
The resident is financially responsible for the actions of the animal
including bodily injury, property damage, replacement of furniture, carpet,
blinds, etc. The resident will be responsible for covering all costs of
returning the unit to the same condition of move-in that are not due to
normal wear and tear as reported via the Room Condition inventory form
completed by the resident upon checking in to the room. This may include
the costs of cleaning or replacing all carpets and furniture to remove pet
odors, dander, hair, etc.
Residential Life has the right to reassign the student to another
accommodation if care of the animal or interactions with others becomes a
concern.
The resident is responsible for meeting with residence staff if they
decide to move from one location to another, arranging for staff notifications
and trainings, and assisting with re-introduction of the animal to a new
community.
